
Bald eagle Haliaeetus leucocephalus

The national symbol for the United States of America the Bald Eagle is one of the most well known birds. The only large with a white head this bird is unmistakable. Usually found near large rivers or lake the bald eagles most commonly feed on fish. The bird is known to steal fish from the smaller osprey.

At on time the species was endangered of extinction and very rare in the lower 48 states. It is now regarded as one of the success stories of the conservation effort in the country in 2007 the population had became stae enough in the continental United States that it was removed from the USFW list of Threatened and Endangered Species. However the bald eagle is

protected by the US Eagle Protection Act.

The bald eagle builds the largest nest in North America. The typical nest is about 5 feet in diameter but can easily reach nine feet as a nesting pair will use the same nest year after year and add to the nest each year. Nest have been recorded weighing over two tons.
